#### St Andrew's Current COVID Closure Status

PARISH IS CLOSED, again. The Town of Kent is in red status on the Connecticut COVID Data Tracker. Therefore, all worship services will be livestreamed (and also recorded, for later viewing) on our YouTube account. In addition, all other parish activities will either be suspended or move to online-only; participants in those activities will be updated separately. The parish will remain in closed status until both Kent and a majority of the surrounding towns are less-than-red for two successive Thursdays.

#### From Fr Douglas

Dear People of St Andrew's Parish,

I pray you are having a blessed and holy Lent.

I know from the many comments and messages I've received how pleased—excited, in fact!—many of you were that we were once again able to worship together 'live' this past Sunday. But that did not last long, as Kent has now

gone red again (sigh). We will, however, now **livestream**, rather than prerecord, our 10:30 Sunday, Wednesday evening and feast day liturgies, so you can participate in them in real-time. We will also record them, for those who prefer to view them at another time. The earliest we will be able to re-open again, under the protocol we adopted in November, is Sunday, 14 March.

We are making progress, at the local, state and national level, in getting this pandemic under control, but as we have all seen, the COVID data this week have gone a bit 'wobbly.' *Please* do your part by getting vaccinated when you are eligible and taking all appropriate precautions.

I do have some good news to share. Thanks to the diligent and dedicated efforts of Candace Conard, Lynn Perry and Laura Filippi, the brand-new St Andrew's Parish Overview and Directory is complete! The listings have been updated, the information about our community has been refreshed and, best of all, there are plenty of color photos. Thanks to a generous gift from donors who wish to remain anonymous, we will be mailing a copy to every household in the parish! Watch your mailbox. And again, a HUGE thank-you to Candace, Lynn and Laura.

Finally, this past Sunday morning at 7:30 we had our first Zoom Morning Prayer. I know that in my life ... and in the lives of many ... the rhythm of daily praise, psalms, Bible reading and prayer is both life-sustaining and soulgrowing. That's the topic of my video message this week, which you can view here.

## OUR LENTEN PRACTICE: Weekly Reflection on *A Path to Wholeness*

Our parish's Lenten practice this year, for those who wish to participate, is

reading the daily meditations in Fr Russell Levenson's wonderful new book, A Path to Wholeness: A Lenten Companion. In future weeks, members of the Vestry will be sharing their reflections. This week, Fr Douglas starts us off:

In his meditation for this past Tuesday (#7), Levenson raises a really important aspect of our faith that I don't think we spend enough time talking about: Through His death on the Cross, Jesus has already suffered any and every punishment God might have chosen to give us on account of our own sins. We have been fully and irrevocably justified in the eyes of God, and we have no reason to fear any final retribution ... and 'fiery finish' (to tap into a popular motif). Because God loves us so deeply, cares for us so exquisitely and created us expressly to be in relationship with God, God sacrificed Godself for all our wrongs. Full stop.

Levenson goes on to point out that this doesn't mean our sins don't carry earthly consequences. We hurt ... we ignore ... we subjugate ... we fail to care. Divine justification doesn't obviate our duty to apologize, make right and reform our ways. But, as Christians, we do so from a place of forgiveness and joy; from the abundance of the mercy Christ has shown us. Precisely because God's forgiveness is assured, we consider the negative effects our actions have on others and seek their forgiveness, as well. This kind of turns the traditional Lenten message upside down ... and points us toward the active agents of peace, rather than the dried-out husks of sin, that Jesus calls us to be.

#### EVERY WEEK: Live Morning Prayer on Sundays

In order to avoid the 'gremlins' that sometimes terminate the live broadcast of our worship over the internet, in November, we moved to pre-recording all our services and uploading them to YouTube. We know, however, that for some parishioners, recorded worship is less meaningful. We also know that for some parishioners, spiritual communion—a service of Holy Eucharist without distribution of the consecrated bread and wine—is not a satisfying worship experience.

Therefore, every Sunday, we will read the office of Morning Prayer, *live*, via Zoom, at 7:30 am. This service will last about 30 minutes (a very brief meditation, but no sermon). We will then keep the Zoom session open for a while afterwards, so members can spend some time chatting with one another and with Fr Douglas, if they'd like.

The Zoom link for Sunday Morning Prayer is <u>here</u>, and it will also be available through the parish web site and in the Saturday edition of the E-pistle. You can also obtain a copy of this week's Morning Prayer readings at both of those places, as well.


You will need a *Book of Common Prayer* for this service. If you do not have one, please contact Fr Douglas, and he will be happy to get one to you.






