Dear People of St Andrew's Parish,

I hope you are doing well and enjoying a blessed Eastertide. Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia, alleluia!

With the crowded calendar of Holy Week and Easter liturgies and activities now behind us, it is time to begin thinking in earnest about the **re-opening of St Andrew's church school on Sunday, 05 June. Ron Marasco,** our new Director of Education, and **Jane Farnol,** our Church School Leader, are dreaming dreams, making plans and getting excited about this new offering. Many of you have mentioned to me memories of the parish's church school in years and decades past. One person even recalled the era when there were 85 students enrolled! (Wow!)

While we might, one day, be so fortunate once again, we are going to begin 'family style': gathered around a table, with Bibles and books, maps and composition books, crayons and glue, in the Undercroft every Sunday at 10:30. Some of our students may want to come each week, but we'll also welcome drop-ins: those who come only occasionally ... grandchildren or nieces and nephews visiting from out-of-town ... those who just want to come and see what it's all about. In addition, parents are more than welcome to sit in on classes, if they wish. Classes will run for about 35-40 minutes, so everyone can come up to the Nave in time for Holy Communion. Our program will be appropriate for children ages 4 to 12; our older students will 'buddy up' with our younger ones.

Ron and Jane, with the assistance of Anne Everett, our church school librarian (thank you, Anne!), are gathering up and organizing resources, and we have an abundance of them. One thing we are searching for is a wooden dining table, with chairs, that seats 10-12 people that we're able to get down into the undercroft. If you have a table you'd be willing to donate, please be in touch with Ron at churchschool.sa.kent@gmail.com.

Re-opening our church school is an exciting, life-giving prospect – indeed, a resurrection, of sorts! How appropriate for us to begin on the last day of Eastertide! Please share the word with everyone you know who is looking for ... or interested in ... or just curious about ... Christian education for their children. Encourage them to come and try us on – no strings attached – no commitments implied! And if they have any questions, let them know they can be in touch with Ron and Jane at the email address given above.


The Thursday Afternoon Club: A New Fellowship Group

Each Sunday during Eastertide this year, we will be praying Evening Prayer at 4:30. Some think of this office as the quintessential Anglican liturgy: quiet in tone, relaxed in pace and reflective. On 15 May, we will hold the office of Evensong—sung Evening Prayer—led by the visiting ensemble Saecula Schola Cantorum.

Following Evening Prayer, we will offer the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, for those who wish to stay. This is a brief but powerful liturgy in which we reverence and contemplate the Presence of Christ ... the Risen Christ ... in the consecrated Bread. We'll use a bit of incense during Benediction, but not during Evening Prayer.

We invite you to try on these liturgies ... and the practice of concluding your Lord's Day in some quiet, joyful worship ... during the season of Easter.

Sunday, 01 May: The Sherman Chamber Ensemble Returns



The Sherman Chamber Ensemble's "Best of Baroque" concerts have been praised as "stunning performances ... inspiring and uplifting." This year promises the same. Usually held in early January to herald in the New Year, this year's Baroque concerts were postponed to the spring out of caution due to the COVID pandemic.

Audiences will be treated to works by masters of the Baroque era played by the best of today's chamber music artists. The concert is in memory of the Ensemble's long-time friend and performer, harpsichordist Ken Cooper, and is dedicated to Bill McGoldrick, remembered for his commitment to the Ensemble.

The program will include music for piano, flute and strings by Corelli, Handel, Vivaldi. It concludes with one of the most beloved works of the Baroque repertoire – Bach's *Brandenburg Concerto No. 5, BWV 105Q* said by some to have secured his place among the greatest composers of the Baroque era.

Joining the Ensemble for the first time is Yamaha Artist and pianist Evan Shinners, a graduate of the Juilliard School and now a mentor at the institution. Since 2010, he has devoted himself almost exclusively to the study and performance of the works of J S Bach.

The Ensemble will present this concert on Sunday, 01 May, at 4:00 pm, here at St Andrew's. General Admission tickets are \$25, and children ages 15 and


THE PARISH IS OPEN.

The Afghan Refugee Family Has Arrived!





Here is an update from the Washington (CT) Refugee Resettlement Project on the family we have helped relocate to New Milford:

Our long-awaited Afghan refugee family has arrived! Two weeks ago, we welcomed a family of six: Mr Alibaba Awrang, Ms Gul Ziwar Awrang, his wife, their 14-year-old daughter, and three sons (ages 10, 12 and 15). The Awrangs are now settling into their New Milford home, which was rented and furnished with your generous donations.

- Mr Awrang is known around the world as one of the most esteemed Islamic calligraphers alive today. An instructor at the Turquoise Mountain Institute of Arts and Architecture, he has participated in exhibitions around the world, including the Smithsonian. Above are two examples of his work.
- Ms. Awrang is a homemaker and talented needle weaver of local Bamiyan patterns. (Bamiyan is a region of Afghanistan known for its weaving and carpets.) We are also seeking a gently used newer model sewing machine or a sponsor for this item. You can email us at info@wrrp.net if interested.
- All members of the family are already working with Literacy Volunteers on the Green to gain English language proficiency, and we are in the process of registering the children in public schools in New Milford.
- They are one of nine families who were evacuated by the Turquoise Mountain Foundation, and are all being resettled in Connecticut (www.turquoisemountain.org). Turquoise Mountain was established in Afghanistan in 2006 by His Royal Highness, The Prince of Wales, to revive historic areas and traditional crafts, to provide jobs, skills and a renewed sense of pride among Afghans.

We are committed to helping Alibaba's family and the other newly arrived Afghan artisans to gain self-sufficiency in their new community, and, with Turquoise Mountain, to help them get back to practicing their art, developing their art business skills, and showcasing their work in exhibitions. *If you have business contacts or suggestions that might assist in this effort, please contact us at info@wrrp.net.*
