It is my great pleasure and pride to announce on behalf of the vestry that two historic events will take place this coming weekend at St. Andrew's.

First, the Reverend Douglas Worthington will become the first priest ever to be ordained at St. Andrew's. The ordination will take place in the Church on this Saturday, September 12th at 12:30 pm.

We welcome you all (first-come, first-served!) to this most extraordinary weekend in the long history of St. Andrew's Parish.


Interested attendees need to sign up immediately with Irene Connors via email (collageconnors@gmail.com) to attend, since socially-distanced seating will limit the number of attendees.

From Reverend Douglas Worthington



Dear people of St Andrew's Parish,

It is not every day that an ordination takes place in a parish. So, as we prepare for my ordination to the priesthood on Saturday afternoon, I thought I would pen a few words about ordination.

"Ordination" comes from the Latin ordo, which means a series, an arrangement or an order of things. In the Anglican tradition, we understand there to be four orders of people within the church. The first order is the laity: Every single baptized Christian is a member of an order of the church—was 'ordained,' as it were, to ministry at her or his baptism. The lay order is the oldest, largest and most important order in the Church! The second order is the diaconate, or deacons. Deacons trace their origin to the Acts of the Apostles, and their primary ministry is service to the world on behalf of the Church. (To be ordained an Episcopal priest, you must first serve a minimum of six months as a deacon, so essential to ordained ministry is this element of serving the world.) The third (and, historically, most recent) order is the priesthood. In the very early church, bishops were the spiritual leaders of all congregations, and there were no priests. As the church grew, however, there were too few bishops to serve all the people, and thus developed the priesthood: a sort of 'bridge' ministry between the bishop, who still oversees the church, and the local parish. The priest's chief ministry is administering the sacraments, preaching, teaching and attending to the spiritual welfare of the parish. The fourth order is, of course, the episcopacy ... the bishops (episcopoi in Greek), whose ministry is pastoring to and overseeing the entire church. Bishops supervise all deacons and priests. (If you'd like to know more about the respective ministries of the orders, there is a helpful summary at pages 855-56 of the Book of Common Prayer.) In the Episcopal Church, we believe all bishops are in "apostolic succession" with the original Apostles, as the bishops they themselves ordained have, in turn, ordained the bishops who came after them and so on. Thus, Bishop lan's and Bishop Laura's ordinations trace directly back to the time of Jesus!

While all of that may (or may not) be interesting history, the most important aspect of ordination is neither historical nor hierarchical. Ordination—including the 'lay ordination' of baptism—is, at heart, an identity. It is a ritual and spiritual clothing of a person to a specific role within the church to which she or he feels called. It is God, and not the church, Who makes the ordinand a member of an order. During every ordination, the Holy Spirit descends upon the ordinand to equip her or him with grace and authority for ministry. But far from being any sort of arrival or completion, ordination is merely a *starting point*. During the ordination rite, the ordinand makes several promises concerning the types and qualities of the ministries she or he will undertake, for which ordination has equipped her or him. And, critically, the People of God—you!—give your consent to the ordination and promise to labor with her or him in ministry.

So, what we will do on Saturday has ancient roots and immediate application; is a highly liturgical experience that initiates a highly practical ministry; and is the briefest moment of consecration that blossoms forward into decades of mutual service. All that ... and even more! I hope you will be with us, either inperson or virtually, this weekend. More importantly, I hope you will join us as we all live out our own ordination vows, as a parish, over the coming years.

May God continue to bless our parish, its people and their work.

New Book Study



We will begin a Monday evening book discussion group, via Zoom (or telephone, if you prefer), on 14-September, from 7:15 - 8:30 pm (we'll start with 15 minutes of social time, since we don't get to see one another very much). Former Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams has written a series of three books that explore our existence as creatures of God (Being Human: Bodies, Minds, Persons (2018)); as Christians (Being Christian: Baptism, Bible, Eucharist and Prayer (2014)); and as spiritual followers of Jesus (Being Disciples: Essentials of the Christian Life (2016)). Each book is under 100 pages and very easy to read, while also giving us a lot to think and talk about. We'll aim to read 25-30 pages per week.

The books are widely available on Amazon and other outlets. (If you cannot afford them or if you are having trouble obtaining them, just let me know-we will get them for you.)

New Bible Study



We will begin a new Bible study group, also via Zoom (or telephone, if you prefer), on Wednesday, 16-September, from 4:30 - 5:30 pm(also with a little social time). We could start this journey practically anywhere, but I've chosen the Gospel according to St Mark, which is the earliest gospel and also the 'parent' of the gospels written by Matthew and Luke. Mark is succinct-often in a hurry, in fact!-and essential. As an added bonus, the gospel he wrote is the one that most of our Sunday lessons will be drawn from for the year that begins this coming Advent: You'll have an inside track!

We won't use any formal curriculum but will proceed through chapter-bychapter. I'll provide some background and commentary, but the group will decide where and how (and how quickly) it wishes to go. Using a study Bible (like the New Oxford Annotated Bible or the Harper-Collins Study Bible) will be a help, but whatever Bible you own will suffice. (We will use the NRSV translation.)

Again, if you would like to participate ... or just try it out for a week or two ... call or email the office and let us know.

Anti-racism group forming



The Episcopal Church in Connecticut has, very trenchantly, been speaking of the twin pandemics we have been confronting in the U.S. this year: COVID-19 and structural racism. There is little, beyond prayer, that we can do as a body of believers to affect the former, but there is a lot in scripture, our tradition and our culture that we can and should explore concerning the latter.

I'd like to bring an informal group together to start doing some of that exploration, again via Zoom (and/or telephone). I do not have a set plan for how we will proceed: Maybe we will read some books ... or watch a film or two ... or hear from experts or eyewitnesses or organizers or our neighbors ... or some of each ... or none of the above. The hardest, and most productive, step is simply to begin engaging with a topic very few of us know much about and very many of us feel quite uncomfortable with.

If you would like to ponder, discern, learn and reflect about this often unspoken but nevertheless pervasive aspect of American culture, please be in touch with me. I won't set a date for us to begin until we have a group assembled and know what time will work best for the greatest number. I do hope you will prayerfully consider joining us in this important intersection of faith, history and society.




