From Father Douglas

Dear People of St Andrew's,

I hope you are doing well. I write this column from the second day of our vacation, where, I'm glad to say, the slow process of unwinding has begun!

Perhaps the chief delight of our time away thus far has been reuniting with some dear ones in our lives whom we had not seen since my diaconal ordination back in December 2019. They live in Canada, and as much as COVID kept all of us apart over the last few years, it kept even more so those who live across international borders. What a blessing to be sharing the rhythms of daily living with them once again, for a few days!

And, you never know what you'll learn during leisurely conversations over the breakfast table. We were lingering over coffee / tea yesterday, and—of all things!—the topic of stewardship came up. They asked what we do for stewardship here at St Andrew's, and I gave them a thumbnail sketch. I then asked what they do at their church and was surprised to hear "nothing." Their parish never has a stewardship campaign ... never sends out an appeal letter ... never runs a column in the church newsletter. How, I asked, do you raise the funds to keep going? Well, they replied, most folks are in the (decades-long)

habit of putting something in the plate, and if a big need arises, folks just dig into their wallets and make a gift.

This got me thinking: In the gospels, there are two ways Jesus 'finances' his own ministry. On the one hand, when he sends out his disciples, he tells them to take no provisions with them and rely solely on the hospitality of strangers (his was a *far* more hospitable culture than ours, I will add!) (*see*, *e.g.*, **Mark 6:7-11**). On the other hand, Jesus also had devoted supporters—several women among them—who gave quite generously to ensure his ministry thrived and reached as many people as possible (*see*, *e.g.*, **Luke 8:1-3**).

Two models of giving, for two different ends. The first is in-the-moment, responding-to-a-need: Someone shows up at the door, and we let them in, feed them and give them a bed for the night. A hurricane ravages a coastline ... or a war of aggression is waged across an established border ... and we open our wallets and our hearts to assist. The second model, however, is more forward-thinking ... more proactive. We believe deeply in a cause and want to ensure not only its survival but also its success, and so, we budget regular, generous gifts to sustain it: perhaps to the Red Cross or Doctors Without Borders ... and definitely, I hope, to St Andrew's.

The parish is always *very* grateful, of course, for gifts that come in unannounced and unexpected. Whether large or small, they contribute greatly to our corporate ministry. But during this stewardship season, I urge you to consider making a pledge: becoming a regular giver ... making St Andrew's part of your annual household budget, like those women who contributed so much to Jesus' earthly ministry. Give not because anything specific has (or hasn't) happened, but because you believe in the mission we're on ... because you want more and more people to hear the Good News ... because you know others who would love as warm and welcoming a home as you yourself have found here ... because, as Jesus did to those women, this place just *speaks* to you, and you are eager—maybe even passionate—to *speak back*, in love and gratitude.

Like our relatives' church, St Andrew's might be able to survive without ever holding a stewardship campaign. But that would deny all of us the opportunity to express how deeply we care about, how greatly we are thankful for and how dearly we hold this parish in our hearts. Who knew a simple pledge card could say so very much?

Take good care, and may God continue to bless the work of the Kingdom you are doing.



All Souls' Day: Wednesday, 02 November



Each year, two days in the liturgical calendar are devoted to prayers for those who have died in the faith. Allhallowtide (or Allsaintstide) occurs on the first and second days of November (with, much more famously, All Hallows' (that is, Saints) Eve beginning after sunset on 31 October). On All Saints' Day, 01 November, we remember all of the apostles, prophets, martyrs and heroes of the Church who have taught us so much, by word and example, through their living (and, sometimes, dying) among us. As a parish, we'll celebrate All Saints' twice this year: with a small, weekday Eucharist at 9:00 on the first, and also at both Eucharists on Sunday, 06 November.

On *All Souls' Day, o2 November*, we recall all of those who have passed on before us and now feast at the heavenly banquet Christ has prepared for all of us. Also known as the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, this day, for us, no longer dwells in notions of purgatory or harbors any *if*s about salvation, for we know it is *assured* by our baptisms! But even so, there is something comforting, reassuring and even unifying in coming together each year to be in spiritual communion with our departed loved ones ... lift up their memories ... and pray for them just as we also pray for those whom we see in this life.

We will gather for our Remembrance of the Faithful Departed at 2:00 pm on Wednesday, 02 November. If you would like to submit the names of loved one who have died, we will include them on our Necrology, praying and tolling the church bell for each one by name. Please email the Parish Office or leave a voicemail, by Sunday, 30 October. A quiet reception in the Parish House will follow this liturgy.


tuna. Make certain that the 'Best by ...' dates are not past! Please remember that the Food Bank accepts pet foods as well!




