### From Father Douglas

Dear People of St Andrew's Parish,

I hope you are doing well. This week, I'd like to briefly touch on two topics near-and-dear to our hearts: wearing masks, which none of us wants to do; and receiving Holy Communion in both kinds, which, I assume, almost all of us want to do.

First, the masks. Several of you have asked why ... or have expressed regret or frustration that ... we're still wearing masks in church. COVID levels in Kent, specifically, and Litchfield County, generally, are low; and at the same time, the local vaccination rate is quite high. So why are we still doing this?

The reason is that we're trying to follow objective, scientific guidance about when vaccinated people should masks at indoor gatherings, rather than relying on opinions and preferences. There is medical evidence that fully vaccinated people can host the virus and transmit it to others without becoming symptomatic themselves. This poses an especial risk for those who cannot be vaccinated, including people who are immuno-compromised, people receiving

chemotherapy and all children under 12. To help prevent this transmission, the current CDC guidance is that *all* people, including those who are fully vaccinated, should wear masks at indoor gatherings if the level of community transmission of the virus in their county is High or Substantial. (The transmission level is based on the number of new cases in the last seven days and the testing positivity rate during the same period. A fuller explanation can be found <a href="here">here</a>.)

The level of community transmission in Litchfield Country is currently Substantial, so we're still asking everyone to wear a mask. *As soon as the level drops to Moderate, masks will once again become optional for fully vaccinated people.* You can find the current level of transmission in Litchfield County on this web site. In addition, both the *Epistle* and a sign on the front door of the church will tell you the current level and whether masks are required or optional.

And now, to Holy Communion in both kinds. While our Anglican theology is absolutely clear that receiving Holy Communion in only one kind (*i.e.*, Bread *or* Wine) is full reception, many of us are accustomed to receiving both the Bread *and* the Wine. Receiving only the Bread, as we've been doing since the Day of Pentecost, has been a blessing ... and yet, it still feels like something's missing.

Therefore, I am very pleased to announce that beginning on Sunday, 31 October, when we will observe the Feast of All Saints this year, we will begin once again distributing the Wine in addition to the Bread. We will do so using small, individual glass cups that the server will bring to you at the rail. (The risks—and the attendant anxieties—of everyone's drinking from the Common Cup still seem too high. We will resume this practice whenever signals indicate that it is prudent to do so.) If you would prefer, for whatever reason, to receive Holy Communion at your seat in the Nave rather than climbing the steps to the rail, we will bring the Bread and Wine to you there, as well. This is very good news, I think, and one more indicator of COVID's loosening grip upon our lives.

If you have any questions or concerns about either of these topics, I'd be delighted to talk about them with you. In the meanwhile, take good care, and may God continue to bless the work of the Kingdom you are doing.

## THE MISSIONS WE SUPPORT: Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services



Perhaps you would like to know more about the charities and agencies that St Andrew's helps fund? Perhaps you might even want to get involved with one of them? Well, we will be highlighting some of the charities and agencies that our parish supports via the Mission & Outreach Commission. This week, we feature Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services of Connecticut, a New Haven-based agency whose mission is to help refugees and other displaced people establish new lives, strengthen hope, and contribute to the vitality of Connecticut's communities. Here is more from their website:

"Refugee families who arrive from overseas come to the U.S. with virtually no material possessions. They have lost homes, friends, family, country, culture, and jobs. Most do not speak any English. They have no income, and many are victims of trauma, with physical or mental health needs. As great as their initial needs are, their potential to enrich our community is even greater.

"Asylum seekers, asylees, and other immigrant families who seek assistance stabilizing their family situation often have many of the same needs as refugees coming from overseas. However, since they are already in the U.S., it is often the case that they have some limited resources or extended support network that can be built upon with the help of IRIS.

"IRIS provides targeted wrap-around services for all clients, using a strength-based assessment model, that offers long-term support for successful integration."

The services IRIS provides include basic needs (shelter and furnishings); case management (integration into the local community); health and wellness support; employment assistance; additional education; immigration legal services; education and youth services; English-language instruction; and services for undocumented neighbors.


