

All Souls' Day: Wednesday, 02 November




Each year, two days in the liturgical calendar are devoted to prayers for those who have died in the faith. Allhallowtide (or Allsaintstide) occurs on the first and second days of November (with, much more famously, All Hallows' (that is, Saints) Eve beginning after sunset on 31 October). On All Saints' Day, 01 November, we remember all of the apostles, prophets, martyrs and heroes of the Church who have taught us so much, by word and example, through their living (and, sometimes, dying) among us. As a parish, we'll celebrate All Saints' twice this year: with a small, weekday Eucharist at 9:00 on the first, and also at both Eucharists on Sunday, 06 November.

On *All Souls' Day, o2 November*, we recall all of those who have passed on before us and now feast at the heavenly banquet Christ has prepared for all of us. Also known as the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, this day, for us, no longer dwells in notions of purgatory or harbors any *if*s about salvation, for we know it is *assured* by our baptisms! But even so, there is something comforting, reassuring and even unifying in coming together each year to be in spiritual communion with our departed loved ones ... lift up their memories ... and pray for them just as we also pray for those whom we see in this life.

We will gather for our Remembrance of the Faithful Departed at 2:00 pm on Wednesday, 02 November. If you would like to submit the names of loved one who have died, we will include them on our Necrology, praying and tolling the church bell for each one by name. Please email the Parish Office or leave a voicemail, by Sunday, 30 October. A quiet reception in the Parish House will follow this liturgy.

It Takes a Parish: From the Stewardship Commission



You have been hearing and reading about Stewardship and have been asked to pledge to sustain and grow our parish. The theme of Stewardship is that pledging is a way to express commitment to St Andrew's, to all it is to each of us and to all we do and aspire to do for others.

Less often talked about is Stewardship as part of Fellowship, defined as "a community of interest, activity, feeling, or experience." St Andrew's is all of those.

This year, the Stewardship Commission included a brochure in our pledge materials—its preparation embodied Fellowship. In addition to the Commission, a dozen people of St Andrew's participated in putting that brochure together and sending it on its way to all of us. Charmian Place and Michael Ward designed the layout. Karen Chase gave us her wonderful photo of the steeple that graces the front cover and George Potts, Michael Ward and George-Ann Gowan sent the other photos that show us at worship, work and play. Douglas and KC were guiding hands throughout.

That is Fellowship ... and Stewardship.

Although the official end of Stewardship season will be Nov. 13, when we celebrate the Feast of St Andrew, we realize that some schedules will not accommodate that date and we will gratefully receive pledges made after that.

At that meeting, we will elect three new vestry members; two delegates to the diocesan annual convention; and two alternates to convention. Vestry members serve three-year terms. The vestry meets monthly, on Thursday evenings, and vestry members are also expected to chair or serve on one commission or head up a project for the parish. Convention delegates represent the parish at the two-day diocesan convention, which usually takes place in Hartford in mid-October.

The Nominating Committee, chaired by Charmian Place, is seeking suggestions for people it may nominate to fill all of these positions. These should be active members of St Andrews who attend worship regularly and contribute both time

and money to the parish.

The Nominating Committee will consider all suggestions that are submitted, as it forms the slate of candidates for the Annual Meeting. If you'd like to suggest someone—and you may definitely toss your own hat into the ring—please complete a Suggestion Form (available in the Narthex and the parish office; or we can email you one) and give it to Charmian or KC by 20 November. 
