From Father Douglas

Dear People of St Andrew's Parish,

I hope you are doing well. It's becoming more and more apparent to me—and hopefully to you, too—that our parish has entered a season of *opening*. Perhaps the way in which this is most obvious is all the re-opening we are doing, after more than a year of COVID. Our regular Sunday and weekday worship schedule has resumed; meetings and discussion groups are being held in-person again; and Coffee Hour, following the 10:30 Eucharist, is now in full swing! We will continue to livestream and record our liturgies and to make Zoom available for those who do not wish to attend meetings in-person, but more and more, we are open to one another, face-to-face, once again.

Another, more subtle *opening* involves the church building itself. It was long a Saint Andrew's tradition to keep the building open to the public, but we had to abandon this practice in the throes of a pandemic. Well, we are once again opening the building (and keeping a light on in the Narthex) every day, during daylight hours. I spend most of my time in the Parish House, but several times a week when I am in the church, visitors and passersby stop in to look around and get to know us a little. I always chat with them a bit and let them know they're very welcome here.

This past Sunday night saw another type of *opening:* our embracing the community more fully. In the lead-up to our 7:00 pm Liturgy of Saints and Bonfire, we opened the doors of the church to the grand parade of trick-ortreaters, with a huge bowl of candy right in the entryway, while Jim and I took

turns greeting them. It was fun and affirming: giving out goodies and marveling at costumes, on our side; and being inside a beautiful church and asking "what goes on in here?" on theirs. More than one parent took her child by the hand, walked into the Nave and shared a few memories about singing in the choir ... or being a member in her own youth ... or attending a wedding or a funeral.

And finally, as I mentioned in this past week's sermon, we will now be keeping the baptismal Font *open*, as well. The Font is, both symbolically *and* literally, the source and origin of our Christian identity. On an experiential level, regardless of where we ourselves may have been baptized, our Font proclaims our having been marked as Christ's own forever. On a scriptural level, the Font recalls Jesus' own baptism in the River Jordan and His command that we go forth into the world, baptizing all nations (Matthew 28:19). And on a sacramental level, the blessed waters of the Font are the ever-presence and ever-flowing of God's abundant grace to and in and through us, always.

And so, whether in worship on a Sunday or on a visit mid-week, whenever you are in the church, I invite you to take a few moments to *open* yourself to the *open* Font. Consider the difference the faith that it initiated in you has made in your life. Reflect on the freedom-of-Christ it has imparted to you. And contemplate, above all, the indissoluble bond (*BCP*, p 298) it has established between God and you. We are baptized only once in our lives, but we never stop living our baptism. Be open to that!

Take good care, and may God continue to bless the work of the Kingdom you are doing.

Afghan Refugee Settlement: An Opportunity to Get Involved

Recently, eight folks from St Andrew's traveled to Washington Depot to learn about plans for helping a refugee family, most likely one from Afghanistan, resettle in the Northwest Corner. The Washington Consortium of Congregations is partnering with <u>Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services</u> (a charity St Andrew's regularly supports) in this effort, and St Andrew's has been invited to participate, as well.

The need is urgent. There are 125,000 refugees currently living on U.S. military bases, and the deadline for relocating them is this year-end. If you would like to learn how you can become involved, visit the Washington Refugee Resettlement Project's web site, which you can access here. On the site you can also volunteer to get involved in a range of ways: helping families with housing, education, job placement, household finances, cultural orientation, etc.


Help Wanted:

ECCT: Annual Convention Summary



On 23 October, the Episcopal Church in Connecticut held its 237th annual convention. (Ours may be the longest continuously running convention in the entire Church.) While the convention was held via Zoom, it still featured a virtual tour of the fully renovated Cathedral in Hartford; worship, in Morning Prayer; and a final address by Bp Ian Douglas, who will be retiring next year.

In addition to approving next year's budget and compensation levels and electing officers and commission / committee members, the convention also adopted several resolutions:

- Recognizing All Saints, in Cornwall, and the diocesan mission at Seabury House, in Bloomfield, as Intentional Episcopal Communities, thus giving them official status within ECCT
- Committing all parishes to become active in advocacy for the climate and to conduct an energy audit, with a view toward improving energy efficiency and reducing consumption
- Committing the diocese to explore and implement appropriate ways to foster right relationship with Indigenous Episcopalians and with our Indigenous neighbors; and forming a Task Force on Relationships with Indigenous People
- Committing the diocese to review and explore ways to reduce the administrative burden on parishes of complying with our Safe Church policies, without reducing our commitment to keeping our local communities safe for all vulnerable people
- Increasing the diocese's investment in young adult ministry; and

 Examining the impact of various social biases within the Church's clergy disciplinary processes




